Last fall, <u>I wrote about</u> the California Legislature's effort to exempt the proposed football stadium in the City of Industry from further environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). I didn't follow up on that post, but the Legislature <u>ultimately approved the exemption</u> in a special session in the fall. Now, <u>Los Angeles Times journalist Patrick McGreevy reports</u> that the stadium's developer, Ed Roski's Majestic Realty, treated three key California lawmakers — including the bill's sponsor — to "hard-toget tickets to Lakers playoff games" this year. (Here's another <u>unflattering perspective on the events that led to that bill's passage</u>, from the San Jose Mercury News).

While it's surely impossible to show a direct connection between the gifts and the legislators' votes, it's hard to see what the state gains by allowing this type of gift-giving.

All that aside, this legislation was unprecedented and dangerous. With <u>another potential stadium developer now seeking a similar exemption</u> from environmental review under CEQA, we're only beginning to see the mischief this type of law can create, with others asking for equal treatment.
