

It looks like the California Chamber of Commerce [has enough signatures](#) to put on the November ballot [their initiative](#) that would drastically change the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). Given that, I'm re-upping the analyses I did earlier this year on the measure: [Part 1](#) (overview), [Part 2](#) (sweeping scope of the initiative in terms of laws affected), [Part 3](#) (broad vested rights created by the initiative), [Part 4](#) (approval changes that apply to all California law), [Part 5](#) (limits on the types of impacts that would be considered under CEQA), [Part 6](#) (changes to the scope and alternatives analyses under CEQA), [Part 7](#) (the broad scope of projects covered by the initiative), [Part 8](#) (the initiative makes future changes very difficult), [Part 9](#) (the gaps in state environmental law the initiative would produce), [Part 10](#) (the issues with CEQA that reforms should tackle).

While the name given the proponents to the initiative is "Building an Affordable California Act", on the ballot the title will be: "Modifies Environmental Review for Certain Projects."
